The residents of the Citizens Committee for the Incorporation of The Town of Paradise Valley had simple goals: Keep zoning to one home per acre, to keep the area entirely residential and to keep government regulation to a minimum.

After its incorporation,

the town quickly became a popular destination for wealthy homeowners and tourists due to its exclusive resorts and luxurious homes.

Longtime resident Beth Wickstrom couldn't imagine living anywhere else – and she's visited a lot of places.

"I attended Judson School in primary school and was able to ride horses for PE. My great-grandmother was one of the first homeowners in Mountain Shadows Estates East. I learned to swim at Mountain Shadows Resort."

She said her grandparents built a home on Tatum Boulevard in 1954.

"My husband and I lived in that house with my grandfather and later moved to another home in the town because my grandfather, Larry Walton, could not understand why we would live anywhere else."

The Wickstroms loved the town so much they built two new homes and remodeled three homes over the years.

"Real estate in the town is an excellent investment," she added.

Business owner, event and play producer Jason Rose of Rose & Allyn PR and "Americano! The Musical" has lived in the town for more than 20 years, noting it's the best small town in America. "Paradise Valley is without a doubt Arizona at her very best."














rural elegance



We have a beautiful community, and residents are committed to keeping the paradise in Paradise Valley. How do residents keep the town's uniqueness? Rural Elegance is one of the elements. The town is special and it did not happen by chance.

Where did the term Rural Elegance come from and what does it mean? In 2018, Mayor Michael Collins, the Town Council, the Planning Commission and residents worked to develop the Visually Significant Corridor Plan and adopted it on Nov. 1, 2018. This plan took a lot of volunteer time and public comment and has great information from the type of plants, benefits of using low lumen lights to foster dark sky, preserving iconic mountains, design elements and other features to preserve Paradise Valley.

The goal from the town's general plan was to "preserve those elements or features, which contribute to the town's quality of life and character as a premier residential community and resort destination with strong rural and historic roots."

The plan identified three Character Zone Design Guidelines consisting of: Patterns of Nature, Resort Living and Rural Elegance.

Comments from current and former Planning Commission members who worked diligently on the plan helps define why the community adopted Rural Elegance design guidelines.

Jon Wainwright said that "it has

long been known that landscaping and trees improve quality of life and real estate values. The leafy suburbs benefit when high traffic corridors set the standard for the community as a whole and this concept of rural elegance benefits our town."

Jim Anton described rural elegance as "Focusing on all the town has done to enhance the visual beauty we all enjoy." Anton added. "Personally, for me, it is the warm feeling one has as they exit the noise, traffic, trucks, etc., of the larger surrounding cities and are greeted by the tranquility of a small, beautiful town. Decompression best describes what comes over one knowing that speeding vehicles, crowded streets and tall buildings are in the rear view mirror and inner peace are at hand." He concluded, "Rural elegance is not just what we see, but how it makes us feel."

Former Planning Commission chair Daran Wastchak said "prior to having this single, comprehensive plan document, continuity between streetscape areas geographically and over time was less likely to be cohesive. The plan allows developers and homeowners to plan ahead, knowing what is expected of them, and to create fairness with a uniform set of requirements, logically laid out, that new properties adhere to."

Wastchak continued, "While it

may be assumed the rural elegance character type is the highest standard of quality for streetscapes in the town, the reality is that it is simply different from the other two character zones of resort living and patterns of nature. It is within each of these zones that you'll find the different levels of quality described in the plan including good, better and best."

Pam Georgelos explained rural elegance as speaking to the town's commitment to preserving the one house per acre lot, the traditional desert and the unique and individual feel of the homes in the town. It is guided by the thoughtfulness of the general plan and visually significant corridors master plan, but it is generally not limited by the elements of a traditional master plan development structure."

So check out the plan on the town's website and learn about design guidelines and plant palettes that can help contribute to Rural Elegance to keep our town unique.



Learn what is happening

The Town Manager's Weekly Newsletter is an update on current events, Town Council actions, legislative activities, and timely information about your homeowner responsibilities. To subscribe, visit paradisevalleyaz.gov or email Amy Rebenar at arebenar@paradisevalleyaz.gov and rest assured, only town staff has access to this mailing list, and it is not shared with anyone.

For public safety information like road closures and recent burglaries, as well as to be notified of Town Council and other public meetings, sign up for Alert PV by visiting paradisevalleyaz. gov. On the menu, click "Living" and go to "Alert Paradise Valley" to sign up. Only town staff has access to your information.

"Coffee with a Cop" is hosted the first Wednesday of the month at 7:30 a.m. at the police station and features a public safety topic of interest along with a chance to visit with our great police staff, ask questions, express concerns, and enjoy coffee and, sometimes, bagels.

You are welcome to attend all Town Council, Planning Commission, Hillside Committee and Board of Adjustment meetings which are open to the public, or you can watch via live-stream or on a recorded video. Town Council meets the second and fourth Thursdays of the month (except July and August) at 3 p.m. for study session and at 6 p.m. for the business meeting where we welcome your public comments and vote on agenda items.

All the information and presentations we use in our decision-making is available for the public and can be found at paradisevalleyaz.gov. Go to "Government" then "Agendas and Meetings."

We also mail information to your homes. Once or twice a year we publish the Town Reporter, a mini magazine with useful homeowner information and updates on elections, the general plan and major town projects. We also mail brochures, postcards or letters about wash maintenance, storm water management, hillside building codes or pool management.

Finally, if your neighbor or the town wants to make a change to property near you that requires public notification, you will receive a postcard or letter inviting you to come to a meeting or provide comment.

Voice your opinion

Call, write or email any Town Council member via their contact information on the town website. You can also reach out to staff members with questions or issues.

You are welcome at any Town Council meeting, which is open to the public and includes an agenda item where you can speak for three minutes on any topic. Simply show up and register to speak. Alternatively, you can submit an eComment via the town's website.

If you wish to comment on matters before the Planning Commission or Board of Adjustment, there are public hearings scheduled on items prior to a vote. You can also email members of the Commission or Board via a link on the town website.

Finally, if there is a proposed change to property near you that requires public input, you will be notified of multiple public or neighborhood meetings where you will have a chance to attend and provide comment or submit comments in writing.

Your Town Council is a committed group of seven volunteers who care about our town. I'm confident speaking for all of us when I say we genuinely want to hear from you. Let us know what you think.

WHY PVSHINES IN ARIZONA!

I was supposed to visit for the weekend. I ended up staying forever.

Growing up in Cincinnati, I was intrigued when a friend invited me to visit him in Arizona. I wondered whether the state had more than cowboys, horses and desert. Even if that's all it had, I was excited to check it out.

Turns out Arizona had a lot more; one of the jewels being Paradise Valley.

Even though I couldn't afford to live in PV when I first moved out here after that 1981 visit, owning a home in PV was a goal. Eventually, I was fortunate to be able to move to PV and it was everything I thought it would be... and so much more.

Why does PV shine so brightly in my eyes, and I expect yours too?

VALUE...

Did you know that while home prices in the Arizona market were down roughly 9% after last year's rapid rise in interest rates, PV home values actually went up 2.3%? The average sale price in PV was a little over \$3,550,000. PV shined brightly above other AZ communities.

STABILITY...

In April of this year, the number of homes that came on the market in PV was at the lowest level in 23 years. People love living here. We come to PV and we don't leave! Because we love living here, a smaller percentage of homes come on the market, which helps the price of our homes. In other words, PV is a very stable market with values that stick and neighbors who do too.

GOVERNMENT...

There are roughly 6,700 single family homes in PV. About 4900 are primary residences, 1300 are secondary residences and 440 are rentals. The small remainder are vacant. When short-term rentals started hurting other communities, our local government fought a 2-year battle to tightly control them and preserve our lifestyle and community. It was successful!

RESIDENTS...

With high profile residents such as the Kellogg family and Muhammad Ali (who once fondly referred to me as the "Muhammad Ali of real estate"), it is no surprise that Paradise Valley enjoys a reputation as home to some of Arizona's most prominent influencers.

DENSITY...

Despite a population of about 14,000, PV's low-density zoning restrictions allow us to benefit from generously spaced homes while maintaining the natural surroundings and the privacy we all so covet. Framed by breathtaking mountains like the legendary Camelback range, the spacious feel of Paradise Valley is another reason it shines so brightly as a community.

SERENITY...

As I make the evening drive from the busy thoroughfare that surrounds my Scottsdale office and cross over into Paradise Valley, I always seem to relax in my car while making the transition from Scottsdale into PV.

As much as I love driving briskly with my Porsche, I slow down to a crawl when I enter PV to enjoy the rest of my drive home. And then I enter my Paradise Valley driveway and settle into the tranquility of my forever home.

Keeping yourself safe from crime

A popular comedian, Bill Engvall, has made a career poking fun at basic human flaws by saying "here's your sign" when somebody does or says something ill-advised.

Our Paradise Valley Police Department works hard to protect the citizens and property of this community, but at times they must wonder about some of the things our residents do that only make their jobs more difficult.

Case in point: in January of 2023, 100% of all thefts from vehicles in Paradise Valley occurred in unlocked vehicles, 50% of home burglaries in unlocked homes, and 100% of stolen vehicles were left unlocked...

Have you found yourself doing the following:



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Meet Leslie Sandbulte, Paradise Valley's artist in residence

Each year the Paradise Valley Arts Board honors an artist in the community with the opportunity to present their work in a year-long display at Town Hall where visitors and residents alike can enjoy the pieces and purchase them.

Leslie Sandbulte is the featured artist for 2022-23.

Behind the scenes, the members of the Arts Board spend years in advance preparing for their upcoming featured artists, sourcing candidates who are town residents by word of mouth and touring those artists' studios. Laura Paquelet-Carpinelli, chair of the board, said that Sandbulte was already in consideration around three years ago.

"It's actually a little bit cumbersome because a lot of the artists that we have are working artists that sell their work, so to put on a show they need to have enough pieces of work," Paquelet-Carpinelli said.

Planning the featured artist in advance allows for the given artist to have time to develop and choose what work they'd like to feature. For Sandbulte's collection, she said that there are around 30 different paintings included.

Unlike a typical art gallery, the town does not take a commission of the profit when one of the pieces is sold. Paquelet-Carpinelli said that 100% of the profits go to the artist.

"If the artist wants to replace a painting that sold, he or she may choose to do that or not," she said. "And it may get replaced immediately or not for a month or two after they create a new one, so it's very organic."

All of the pieces displayed are available for purchase, but whether they are replaced is the artist's prerogative. Sandbulte's exhibition is free to the

public during Town Hall's operating hours and will be there until the end of September 2023.

"We don't just do it because we like Leslie, right?" she said. "We do like Leslie, we love Leslie, but we're doing it to help build community and create an event that's free for the community."

Through the Featured Artist opportunity, Paradise Valley residents are essentially able to get to know one of their neighbors through their artwork, Paquelet-Carpinelli continued. The Paradise Valley Arts Board, aside from the Featured Artist program, also contributes events that celebrate the arts in the community.

"It's not art, nor is it community," Paquelet-Carpinelli

said. "It's both, where the art helps build community and the community steps in and supports the art."

A long-time Seattle resident, Leslie Sandbulte didn't begin her career as a professional, full-time artist until her mid-40s. Before launching this era of her career, she was still tied to the arts, teaching art lessons in a private setting to students of all ages.

The turning point came when she developed a liking for Russian impressionism — a sub-genre that depicts subjects in a poetic and lyrical way — while taking a class at the Scottsdale Artists' School.

Given this influence, her pieces create a narrative with what appears to be just a simple portrait. Paquelet-Carpinelli talked about how

looking at her work can raise many questions about the subject's intent or emotions.

Reading an excerpt of her speech for Sandbulte's opening reception, Paquelet-Carpinelli said, "To me, it is simply impressive how Leslie managed to create so many different characters oozing endless amounts of personality and igniting our curiosity about what the subjects are pondering."

She continued to say that Sandbulte's work to her stood out from the other artists considered because of this different storytelling quality.

Sandbulte, who's been a resident of Paradise Valley now for about seven years, made the move to the Valley after deciding to focus on her own art as well as her ties to the Scottsdale Artists' School where she first was inspired to pursue this passion.

"I told my husband, 'I need to do this for about 10 years, so don't ask me when I'm going to make money because I probably won't for 10 years, but I will make it someday. Someday I will make it," Sandbulte said of her transition from exclusively teaching art.

She made that deadline. Over those 10 years, Sandbulte worked on her craft and was even picked up by an art gallery in Scottsdale.

Now, she has her own studio in Old Town Scottsdale where she displays and sells her work. When asked about what works she chose to display in the Featured Artist exhibition, Sandbulte said that she told the board during their studio tour that they could take all the work that she had on display.

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Giving her work to be displayed at Town Hall, Sandbulte explained that it's a rewarding experience to share her finished pieces with others. (Special to the Independent/Arianna Grainey)

The vintage car show creates an opportunity for residents of Paradise Valley that own and appreciate collector cars to meet at the Town Hall Parking lot and discuss one of our favorite passions, the automo-

bile. You do not need to be a resident to display your car or to attend the show, it is open to everyone.

To be eligible, automobiles must be pre-1983 sports, antique, special interest, race car, truck or motorcycle. We request a minimum donation of \$50 from each car participant, but there is no fee to come to view the vintage cars. All proceeds are donated to two Arizona Veterans' organizations: Sentinels of Freedom and Military Assistance Mission.

The Paradise Valley Vintage Car Show has been recognized as one of the best car shows in the Valley. We are very fortunate that we have many car collectors in Paradise Valley who enjoy sharing their vintage cars with all who attend. 
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
